



A MAORI "WAKA" OR CANOE

- Dates back to AD 800
- •The Ancestors of Maori reach Aotearoa New Zealand in 7 Waka canoes
- Waka is A "Metaphor" for collaboration. Where are you in the canoe?

THE TE WHARIKI

- •A woven mat for all to stand on
- Made up of 4 principles and 5 strands
- •Principles: Empowerment, holistic development, family & community and Relationships.
- •Strands: wellbeing, belonging, contribution, communication and exploration.
- •Together these principles and strands give expression to the vision for children, and that is at the heart of the Te Whariki.
- •The Te Whariki is used similarly to our early learning Framework.

•The real strength of the Te Whariki is its capacity to establish strong and durable foundations for every culture in Aotearoa New Zealand, and in the world....Te Whariki rests on the theory that all children will succeed in education when the foundations to their learning are based on an understanding and a respect for their cultural roots.


- Our goal is to create an environment that is full of meaning!






DOCUMENTATION ON MAP MAKING

Mission Statement

Our aim is to make learning contagious, finding each childs' and teachers' individual spark. We believe in building positive and open relationships wour children, their whanau and the wider community. We value communication with parents and whanau to collaborate and contribute to childre learning and the centre.

Guiding Pedagogy

Our planning and assessment processes are based on the principles of The Early Childhood Curriculum, Te Whāriki, and this supports all of our practices. Our teachers are constantly engaged in professional development to ensure the best outcomes for all children.

We respect and honour Te Tiriti O Waitangi as the foundation document of Aotearoa by actively promoting Tikanga Māori and Te Reo Māori.

Our teaching practices are inspired by the Reggio Emilia Philosophy. This approach to teaching and learning focuses on the child being a competent learner, being equipped with "A hundred languages" which they communicate and learn through. The learning environment is seen as the third teacher, which provokes curiosity and wonder, which enables the children to test out their working theories.

Our infant and toddler care involves Primary Caregiving adapted by the RIE philosophy, which encompasses respect as a focal point. This means that we embrace the child's ability in self-discovery and encourage them to make sense of their world in their own way, at their own time.

Overarching Values

As a multi-cultural centre, we celebrate inclusion and support the modifferent cultures and diverse learners within our centre. These are integral part of our practice, including the unique dual heritage Aotearoa where we provide accessibility for whanau to contrib from anywhere in the world.

We are committed to respecting our children as individuals, their vo and their rights, to allow them to be active participants in the thinking and learning.

We believe that trust is paramount in establishing and maintair strong relationship with children, parents and whānau. When child and whānau feel safe, loved and secure, the best learning outcor occur. We see this as an essential link to children's development.

These important relationships play a crucial role in empowering children to be able to relate and make connections with their work people, places and things.


